**THE WIRELINE COMPETITION BUREAU SEEKS COMMENT ON
APPEAL OF NEW FLORENCE TELEPHONE COMPANY CONCERNING A DECISION OF
THE UNIVERSAL SERVICE ADMINISTRATOR TO SUSPEND ITS
HIGH-COST UNIVERSAL SERVICE PAYMENTS**

The Wireline Competition Bureau seeks comment on an appeal filed by New Florence Telephone Company (New Florence), pursuant to sections 54.719(c) and 54.720(a) of the Commission's rules, of a November 5, 2004 decision issued by the Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC) that suspends and withholds high-cost support payments to New Florence.¹ Among other things, New Florence contends that suspension of high-cost support violates its due process and property rights, and restricts the ability of New Florence to provide telecommunications service to its customers.²

Pursuant to Sections 1.415 and 1.419 of the Commission's rules, 47 C.F.R. §§ 1.415, 1.419, interested parties may file comments on or before **January 7, 2005**, and reply comments on or before **January 18, 2005**. Comments may be filed using the Commission's Electronic Comment Filing System (ECFS) or by filing paper copies.³

Comments filed through the ECFS can be sent as an electronic file via the Internet to <http://www.fcc.gov/cgb/ecfs/>. Generally, only one copy of an electronic submission must be filed. If multiple docket or rulemaking numbers appear in the caption of this proceeding, however, commenters must transmit one electronic copy of the comments to each docket or rulemaking number referenced in

the caption. In completing the transmittal screen, commenters should include their full name, U.S. Postal Service mailing address, and the applicable docket or rulemaking number. Parties may also submit an electronic comment by Internet e-mail. To get filing instructions for e-mail comments, commenters should send an e-mail to ecfs@fcc.gov, and should include the following words in the body of the message, "get form." A sample form and directions will be sent in reply. Parties who choose to file by paper must file an original and four copies of each filing. If more than one docket or rulemaking number appears in the caption of this proceeding, commenters must submit two additional copies for each additional docket or rulemaking number.

Filings can be sent by hand or messenger delivery, by commercial overnight courier, or by first-class or overnight U.S. Postal Service mail (although we continue to experience delays in receiving U.S. Postal Service mail).
