COMMENT AND REPLY COMMENT DATES ESTABLISHED FOR NINTH NOTICE OF PROPOSED RULEMAKING SEEKING COMMENT ON IMPLEMENTATION OF A NATIONWIDE, BROADBAND, INTEROPERABLE PUBLIC SAFETY NETWORK IN THE 700 MHZ BAND

On December 20, 2006, the Commission adopted and released a *Ninth Notice of Proposed Rulemaking* in PS Docket No. 06-229 and WT Docket No. 96-86 (*Ninth NPRM*). The *Ninth NPRM* proposes a national, centralized approach to maximize public safety access to interoperable, broadband spectrum in the 700 MHz band. In addition, the initiative seeks to promote the deployment of advanced broadband applications, related radio technologies, and modern, IP-based system architecture. A summary of the *Ninth NPRM* was published in the Federal Register on January 10, 2007, triggering the cycle for comments and reply comments.²

This matter shall be treated as a "permit-but-disclose" proceeding in accordance with the Commission's *ex parte* rules.³ Persons making oral *ex parte* presentations are reminded that memoranda summarizing the presentations must contain summaries of the substance of the presentations and not merely a listing of the subjects discussed. More than a one- or two-sentence description of the views and arguments presented is generally required.⁴ Other rules pertaining to oral and written presentations are set forth in Section 1.1206(b) of the Commission's rules.⁵

Commenters who file information that they believe should be withheld from public inspection may request confidential treatment pursuant to Section 0.459 of the Commission's rules.
