NOTICE OF APPARENT LIABILITY FOR FORFEITURE

Released: February 9, 2007 Adopted: February 8, 2007

INTRODUCTION

In this Notice of Apparent Liability for Forfeiture ("NAL") issued pursuant to Section 503(b) of the Communications Act of 1934, as amended (the "Act"), and Section 1.80 of the Commission's Rules (the "Rules"), 1 by the Chief, Media Bureau pursuant to authority delegated under Section 0.283 of the Rules, we find that LeSea Broadcasting of Tulsa, Inc. (the "Licensee"), licensee of Station KWHB(TV), Tulsa, Oklahoma (the "Station"), apparently violated Sections 73.3526(e)(11)(i) and (e)(11)(ii) of the Rules, by failing to place in the Station's public inspection file all required TV issues/programs lists and records concerning compliance with the children's programming commercial limits.³ Based upon our review of the facts and circumstances before us, we conclude that the Licensee is apparently liable for a monetary forfeiture in the amount of thirteen thousand five hundred dollars (\$13,500).

BACKGROUND II.

Section 73.3526 of the Rules requires a commercial broadcast licensee to maintain a public inspection file containing specific types of information related to station operations.⁴ Subsection 73.3526(e)(11)(i) provides that a TV issues/programs list is to be placed in a commercial TV broadcast station's public inspection file each calendar quarter. In addition, pursuant to subsection 73.3526(e)(11)(ii), each commercial television broadcast station is required to place in its public inspection file, on a quarterly basis, records sufficient to allow substantiation of the licensee's certification, in its renewal application, of its compliance with the children's television commercial limits imposed by Section 73.670 of the Rules.⁵ These subsections of Section 73.3526 require licensees to place TV issues/programs lists and records concerning commercial limits for each quarter in the station's public inspection file by the tenth day of the succeeding calendar quarter. Where lapses occur in maintaining the public file, neither the negligent acts nor omissions of station employees or agents, nor the subsequent

remedial actions undertaken by the licensee, excuse or nullify the licensee's rule violation.⁶

3. On February 1, 2006, the Licensee filed its license renewal application (FCC Form 303-S) for Station KWHB(TV) (the "Application") (File No. BRCT-20060201AKZ). In response to Section IV, Question 3 of the Application, the Licensee stated that, during the previous license term, it had failed to timely place in its public inspection file all of the documentation required by Section 73.3526 of the Commission's Rules. In Exhibit 17, the Licensee indicated that it "inadvertently neglected" to place into its public inspection file records concerning compliance with the children's programming commercial limits for the third quarter of 1998 through the fourth quarter of 2000. In addition, the Licensee stated that it did not complete and place in the public file TV issues/programs lists for the third quarter of 1998 through the third quarter of 2003. The Licensee stated that there were no commercial overages during the license term and that it has recreated the missing records concerning commercial limits and placed them into the public inspection file. The Licensee also maintained that it is attempting to reconstruct the missing TV issues/programs lists and that it has implemented measures to prevent recurrence of these errors.

III. DISCUSSION

- 4. The Licensee's failure to place in its Station KWHB(TV) public inspection file all of the required documentation constitutes apparent willful and repeated violations of Sections 73.3526(e)(11)(i) and 73.3526(e)(11)(ii) of the Rules. This *NAL* is issued pursuant to Section 503(b)(1)(B) of the Act. Under that provision, any person who is determined by the Commission to have willfully or repeatedly failed to comply with any provision of the Act or any rule, regulation, or order issued by the Commission shall be liable to the United States for a forfeiture penalty. Section 312(f)(1) of the Act defines willful as "the conscious and deliberate commission or omission of [any] act, irrespective of any intent to violate" the law. The legislative history to Section 312(f)(1) of the Act clarifies that this definition of willful applies to both Sections 312 and 503(b) of the Act, and the Commission has so interpreted the term in the Section 503(b) context. Section 312(f)(2) of the Act provides that "[t]he term repeated," when used with reference to the commission or omission of any act, means the commission or omission of such act more than once or, if such commission or omission is continuous, for more than one day."
- 5. The Commission's *Forfeiture Policy Statement* and Section 1.80(b)(4) of the Rules establish a base forfeiture amount of \$10,000 for violation of Section 73.3526.¹² In determining the appropriate forfeiture amount, we may adjust the base amount upward or downward by considering the factors enumerated in Section 503(b)(2)(D) of the Act, including "the nature, circumstances, extent and gravity of the violation, and, with respect to the violator, the degree of culpability, any history of prior

offenses, ability to pay, and such other matters as justice may require."13

6. In this case, the Licensee reported that records concerning compliance with the children's programming commercial limits for the third quarter of 1998 through the fourth quarter of 2000 and TV issues/programs lists for the third quarter of 1998 through the third quarter of 2003 were not placed in the public inspection file. As a result, the public file was missing numerous required documents for an extended period of time. Accordingly, we find that the Licensee is apparently liable for a forfeiture in the amount of \$13,500 for its apparent willful and repeated violations of Sections 73.3526(e)(11)(i) and (e)(11)(ii).

IV. ORDERING CLAUSES

- 7. Accordingly, IT IS ORDERED, pursuant to Section 503(b) of the Communications Act of 1934, as amended, and Section 1.80 of the Commission's Rules, that LeSea Broadcasting of Tulsa, Inc. is hereby NOTIFIED of its APPARENT LIABILITY FOR FORFEITURE in the amount of thirteen thousand five hundred dollars (\$13,500) for its apparent willful and repeated violations of Sections 73.3526(e)(11)(i) and (e)(11)(ii) of the Commission's Rules.
- 8. IT IS FURTHER ORDERED, pursuant to Section 1.80 of the Commission's Rules, that, within thirty (30) days of the release date of this *NAL*, LeSea Broadcasting of Tulsa, Inc. SHALL PAY the full amount of the proposed forfeiture or SHALL FILE a written statement seeking reduction or cancellation of the proposed forfeiture.
- 9. Payment of the proposed forfeiture must be made by check or similar instrument, payable to the order of the Federal Communications Commission. The payment must include the NAL/Acct. No. and FRN No. referenced above. Payment by check or money order may be mailed to Federal Communications Commission, at P.O. Box 358340, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania 15251-8340. Payment by overnight mail may be sent to Mellon Bank/LB 358340, 500 Ross Street, Room 1540670, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania 15251. Payment by wire transfer may be made to ABA Number 043000261, receiving bank Mellon Bank, and account number 911-6106.
- 10. The response, if any, must be mailed to Office of the Secretary, Federal Communications Commission, 445 12th Street, S.W., Washington, D.C. 20554, ATTN: Barbara A. Kreisman, Chief, Video Division, Media Bureau, and MUST INCLUDE the NAL/Acct. No. referenced above.
- 11. The Commission will not consider reducing or canceling a forfeiture in response to a claim of inability to pay unless the respondent submits: (1) federal tax returns for the most recent three-year period; (2) financial statements prepared according to generally accepted accounting practices ("GAAP"); or (3) some other reliable and objective documentation that accurately reflects the respondent's current financial status. Any claim of inability to pay must specifically identify the basis for the claim by reference to the financial documentation submitted.
