PUBLIC SAFETY AND HOMELAND SECURITY BUREAU APPROVES REGION 40 (NORTHERN TEXAS) 700 MHZ REGIONAL PLAN AMENDMENT

PS Docket No. 06-229 and WT Docket No. 02-378

Introduction. On January 31, 2008, the Region 40 (Northern Texas)¹ 700 MHz Regional Planning Committee (RPC) (Region 40) submitted a proposed amendment to its 700 MHz Public Safety Plan for review and approval.² Region 40 concurrently requested a temporary, limited waiver of Section 90.527(a)(3) and (6) of the Commission's rules, 47 C.F.R. §§ 90.527(a)(3), (6) (requiring that regional plans incorporate a general description of how the spectrum would be allotted among the various eligible users, and a detailed description of how the plan put the spectrum to the best possible use).³ Region 40 stated that it utilizes the Computer Assisted Pre-allocation Resource and Database (CAPRAD) program as its pre-allotment methodology.⁴ However, at the time, CAPRAD was not yet updated to reflect the new consolidated narrowband frequencies.⁵

In addition, Region 40 requested a temporary, limited waiver of Section 90.527(a)(5) of the Commission's rules, 47 C.F.R. §§ 90.527(a)(5) (which provides that regional plans must include an explanation of how the plan had been coordinated with adjacent regions). On November 20, 2008, Region 40 resubmitted its Plan Amendment, providing updated letters of concurrence from all seven

adjacent regions and a revised spectrum plan for new consolidated narrowband frequencies.⁶ As a result, the waiver request in its entirety is now moot. For the reasons discussed below, we approve the Region 40 700 MHz Plan Amendment, and dismiss the Waiver Request as moot.

Background. On July 31, 2007, the Federal Communications Commission (Commission) adopted a *Second Report and Order* revising the rules governing wireless licenses in the 700 MHz band. The Commission adopted a plan for the 700 MHz band to establish a nationwide, interoperable public safety broadband communications network for the benefit of state and local public safety users. The Commission designated the lower half of the 700 MHz public safety band for broadband communications (763-768/793-798 MHz) and consolidated existing narrowband allocations in the upper half of the public safety 700 MHz band (769-775/799-805 MHz).

In revising the band plan for the public safety 700 MHz band, the Commission noted that consolidating the narrowband channels in the upper part of the band will impact approved and pending 700 MHz RPC plans. Accordingly, the Commission required RPCs with approved plans or plans on file to submit amended plans consistent with the decisions adopted in the *Second Report and Order* by November 23, 2007. On November 9, 2007, the Public Safety and Homeland Security Bureau extended the deadline for RPCs to submit amended plans, consistent with the decisions adopted in the *Second Report and Order*, to January 31, 2008, and provided additional guidance for the development of plan amendments.

Region 40 Plan Amendment. The Plan Amendment revises all references to the former General Use band, to the new narrowband consolidated band and includes a new Appendix I – Region 40 Channel Allotment Table, ¹⁰ which reflects allocations in the new consolidated narrowband segments 769-775 MHz and 799-805 MHz. In addition, the Plan Amendment includes changes to the procedures for applying for new spectrum allotments, and an improved process for evaluating an applicant's needs. ¹¹

Region 40 coordinated the Plan Amendment and obtained letters of concurrence from the seven regions adjacent to Region 40: Region 4 (Arkansas), Region 18 (Louisiana), Region 34 (Oklahoma), Region 49 (Texas-Austin), Region 50 (Texas-El Paso), Region 51 (Texas-Houston), and Region 52 (Texas-Lubbock). 12

On April 3, 2009, the Region 40 Plan Amendment was placed on *Public Notice* for comment. We received no comments. We have reviewed the Region 40 Plan Amendment, and conclude, based on the information before us, that it complies with FCC rules and policies. Accordingly, pursuant to Section 4(i) of the Communications Act of 1934, as amended, 47 U.S.C. § 154(i), and Section 1.102(b) of the Commission's rules, 47 C.F.R. § 1.102(b), the Region 40 (Northern Texas) 700 MHz Public Safety Plan Amendment is APPROVED.
