DOMESTIC SECTION 214 AUTHORIZATION GRANTED

Domestic Section 214 Application Filed for the Transfer of Control of Epana Networks, Inc. from Sienna Limited Partnership III, LP to Progress International, LLC

WC Docket No. 10-163

On August 26, 2010, Epana Networks, Inc. (Epana), Sienna Limited Partnership III, LP, and Progress International, LLC (Progress) (together, Applicants) filed an application pursuant to section 63.03 of the Commission's rules to complete a transfer of control of Epana from Sienna, as representative of the stockholders of Vivaro Corporation, to Progress International, LLC (Progress).

On August 26, 2010, the Commission released a public notice accepting the application for streamlined processing.² On September 1, 2010, the Department of Justice, including the Federal Bureau of Investigation, with the concurrence of the Department of Homeland Security (collectively, the Executive Branch Agencies), filed a letter requesting that the Commission defer action on the application while they reviewed potential national security, law enforcement, and public safety issues.³ In response to the request, the Wireline Competition Bureau removed the application from streamlined review.⁴ On January 19, 2011, the Executive Branch Agencies withdrew their request to defer action, stating that they have no objection to the application.⁵

The Wireline Competition Bureau finds, upon consideration of the record, that grant of the application will serve the public interest, convenience, and necessity. The proposed transaction qualified for streamlined processing because none of the Applicants are facilities-based carriers.⁶ Consistent with

Pursuant to section 1.103 of the Commission's rules, 47 C.F.R. § 1.103, the grant is effective upon release of this Public Notice. Petitions for reconsideration under section 1.106 or applications for review under section 1.115 of the Commission's rules, 47 C.F.R. §§ 1.106, 1.115, may be filed within 30 days of the date of this Public Notice.
