ORDER

Adopted: April 11, 2013 Released: April 17, 2013

By the Deputy Chief, Consumer Policy Division, Consumer & Governmental Affairs Bureau:

- 1. In this Order, we consider the complaints¹ alleging that Legent Communications Corporation d/b/a Long Distance Services (LDS) changed Complainants' telecommunications service providers without obtaining authorization and verification from Complainants in violation of the Commission's rules.² We conclude that LDS's actions did result in unauthorized changes in Complainants' telecommunications service providers and we grant Complainants' complaints.
- 2. In December 1998, the Commission released the *Section 258 Order* in which it adopted rules to implement Section 258 of the Communications Act of 1934 (Act), as amended by the Telecommunications Act of 1996 (1996 Act).³ Section 258 prohibits the practice of "slamming," the submission or execution of an unauthorized change in a subscriber's selection

of a provider of telephone exchange service or telephone toll service.⁴ In the *Section 258 Order*, the Commission adopted aggressive new rules designed to take the profit out of slamming, broadened the scope of the slamming rules to encompass all carriers, and modified its existing requirements for the authorization and verification of preferred carrier changes. The rules require, among other things, that a carrier receive individual subscriber consent before a carrier change may occur.⁵ Pursuant to Section 258, carriers are absolutely barred from changing a customer's preferred local or long distance carrier without first complying with one of the Commission's verification procedures.⁶ Specifically, a carrier must: (1) obtain the subscriber's written or electronically signed authorization in a format that meets the requirements of Section 64.1130; (2) obtain confirmation from the subscriber via a toll-free number provided exclusively for the purpose of confirming orders electronically; or (3) utilize an independent third party to verify the subscriber's order.⁷

- 3. The Commission also has adopted liability rules. These rules require the carrier to absolve the subscriber where the subscriber has not paid his or her bill. In that context, if the subscriber has not already paid charges to the unauthorized carrier, the subscriber is absolved of liability for charges imposed by the unauthorized carrier for service provided during the first 30 days after the unauthorized change. Where the subscriber has paid charges to the unauthorized carrier, the Commission's rules require that the unauthorized carrier pay 150% of those charges to the authorized carrier, and the authorized carrier shall refund or credit to the subscriber 50% of all charges paid by the subscriber to the unauthorized carrier. Carriers should note that our actions in this order do not preclude the Commission from taking additional action, if warranted, pursuant to Section 503 of the Act. On the subscriber of the unauthorized carrier.
- 4. We received Complainants' complaints alleging that Complainants' telecommunications service providers had been changed to LDS without Complainants' authorization. Pursuant to Sections 1.719 and 64.1150 of our rules, we notified LDS of the

complaints and LDS responded.¹³ LDS states that authorizations were received and confirmed thru third party verifications (TPVs). We have reviewed the TPVs that LDS submitted with its responses. The Commission's rules require that the verification elicit, amongst other things, confirmation that the person on the call is "authorized to make the carrier change." In each of the TPVs at issue, the verifier instead asks whether the person on the call "is the authorized person to accept changes on the account?" but did not confirm whether the person was authorized to make the carrier change. A switch from one carrier to another carrier differs from merely making changes to the customer's services.¹⁵ As we emphasized in the *Fourth Report and Order*, "any description of the carrier change transaction...shall not be misleading" and verifiers should convey explicitly that "the consumers will have authorized a carrier change, and not for instance an upgrade in existing service (emphasis added)." We find that LDS's actions were in violation of our carrier change rules, and we discuss Lone Distance Access's liability below.¹⁷

- 5. LDS must remove all charges incurred for service provided to Complainants for the first thirty days after the alleged unauthorized change in accordance with the Commission's liability rules. We have determined that Complainants are entitled to absolution for the charges incurred during the first thirty days after the unauthorized change occurred and that neither the Complainants authorized carrier nor LDS may pursue any collection against Complainants for those charges. Any charges imposed by LDS on the subscribers for service provided after this 30-day period shall be paid by the subscribers to the authorized carrier at the rates the subscribers were paying to the authorized carriers at the time of unauthorized change of telecommunications service provider. - 6. Accordingly, IT IS ORDERED that, pursuant to Section 258 of the Communications Act of 1934, as amended, 47 U.S.C. § 258, and Sections 0.141, 0.361 and 1.719 of the Commission's rules, 47 C.F.R. §§ 0.141, 0.361, 1.719, the complaints filed against Legent Communications Corporation d/b/a Long Distance Services, ARE GRANTED.

- 7. IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that, pursuant to section 64.1170(d) of the Commission's rules, 47 C.F.R. § 64.1170(d), Complainants are entitled to absolution for the charges incurred during the first thirty days after the unauthorized change occurred and neither Legent Communications Corporation d/b/a Long Distance Services nor the authorized carriers may pursue any collection against Complainants for those charges.
 - 8. IT IS FURTHER ORDERED that this Order is effective upon release.
