REGION 6 (NORTHERN CALIFORNIA) PUBLIC SAFETY REGIONAL PLANNING  
COMMITTEES TO HOLD 700 MHZ AND 800 MHZ NSPAC PLANNING MEETINGS**

The Region 6 (Northern California)<sup>1</sup> Public Safety Regional Planning Committees (RPCs) will hold two consecutive planning meetings on Thursday, March 12, 2015. Beginning at 1:00 p.m., the 700 MHz RPC will convene at 2741 Napa Valley Corporate Drive, Building #2 Napa, California, 94558.
