INTERNATIONAL BUREAU SEEKS COMMENT ON THE NEXT ORBIT ACT REPORT

Pleading Cycle Established

IB Docket No. 16-50

Comment Date: March 21, 2016

Section 646 of the Open-Market Reorganization for the Betterment of International Telecommunications Act (ORBIT Act)¹ requires the Commission to report annually to the Committees on Commerce and International Relations of the U.S. House of Representatives and the Committees on Commerce, Science, and Transportation and Foreign Relations of the U.S. Senate.² The purpose of the ORBIT Act is to promote a fully competitive global market for satellite communications services for the benefit of consumers and providers of satellite services and equipment by fully privatizing the intergovernmental satellite organizations, INTELSAT and Inmarsat.³

For the next report to Congress, we seek comment on the impact of privatization on U.S. industry, jobs, and industry access to the global marketplace and any progress since the last report affecting the objectives of the ORBIT Act. Comments will be reflected in the next ORBIT Act report and made available in full to the House and Senate committees.

Comments should be filed on or before **March 21, 2016**, and reply comments on or before **April 4, 2016**, in **IB Docket No. 16-50**.

Pursuant to section 1.415 and 1.419 of the Commission's rules,⁴ interested parties may file comments and reply comments on or before the dates indicated above. Comments may be filed using the Commission's Electronic Comment Filing System (ECFS).⁵

- Paper Filers: Parties who choose to file by paper must file an original and one copy of each filing. If more than one docket or rulemaking number appears in the caption of this proceeding, filers must submit two additional copies for each additional docket or rulemaking number.
