WIRELINE COMPETITION BUREAU INVITES COMMENTS ON IMPLEMENTATION OF THE NATIONAL SUICIDE HOTLINE IMPROVEMENT ACT OF 2018

The National Suicide Hotline Improvement Act of 2018 (Act)¹ was signed into law on August 14, 2018. The Act directs the Commission to (1) conduct a study that examines the feasibility of designating a simple, easy-to-remember, 3-digit dialing code to be used for a national suicide prevention and mental health crisis hotline system; and (2) analyze how well the current National Suicide Prevention Lifeline is working to address the needs of veterans.² The Act also directs the Commission to coordinate with the Department of Health and Human Services' Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, the Secretary of Veterans Affairs, and the North American Numbering Council in conducting the study, and to produce a report on the study by August 14, 2019.³ The Commission's report must recommend whether a particular N11 dialing code or simple, easy-to-remember, 3-digit dialing code should be used for a national suicide prevention and mental health crisis hotline system and, if so, the logistics and costs associated with designating such a dialing code, among other issues.⁴

The Wireline Competition Bureau invites comments from interested stakeholders on the issues that the Commission must address in the study and the report required by the Act. Today, the Wireline Competition Bureau also directs the North American Numbering Council to consider and provide recommendations on the issues the Commission must address when conducting the study.⁵

Pursuant to section 1.419 of the Commission's rules, 47 CFR § 1.419, interested parties may file comments on or before the date indicated above. All filings should refer to WC Docket No. 18-336 and CC Docket No. 92-105. Filings must be addressed to the Commission's Secretary, Office of the Secretary, Federal Communications Commission. Comments may be filed by paper or by using the Commission's Electronic Comment Filing System (ECFS). See Electronic Filing of Documents in Rulemaking Proceedings, 63 FR 24121 (1998).

filing. Filings can be sent by hand or messenger delivery, by commercial overnight courier, or by first-class or overnight U.S. Postal Service mail.

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Proceedings WC Docket No. 18-336 and CC Docket No. 92-105 have been designated as a "permit-but-disclose" proceeding in accordance with the Commission's ex parte rules,⁶ Persons making ex parte presentations must file a copy of any written presentation or a memorandum summarizing any oral presentation within two business days after the presentation (unless a different deadline applicable to the Sunshine period applies). Persons making oral ex parte presentations are reminded that memoranda summarizing the presentation must (1) list all persons attending or otherwise participating in the meeting at which the ex parte presentation was made, and (2) summarize all data presented and arguments made during the presentation. If the presentation consisted in whole or in part of the presentation of data or arguments already reflected in the presenter's written comments, memoranda or other filings in the proceeding, the presenter may provide citations to such data or arguments in his or her prior comments, memoranda, or other filings (specifying the relevant page and/or paragraph numbers where such data or arguments can be found) in lieu of summarizing them in the memorandum. Documents shown or given to Commission staff during ex parte meetings are deemed to be written ex parte presentations and must be filed consistent with rule 1.1206(b). In proceedings governed by rule 1.49(f) or for which the Commission has made available a method of electronic filing, written ex parte presentations and memoranda summarizing oral ex parte presentations, and all attachments thereto, must be filed through the electronic comment filing system available for that proceeding, and must be filed in their native format (e.g., .doc, .xml, .ppt, searchable .pdf). Participants in these proceedings should familiarize themselves with the Commission's ex parte rules.
