ROBERT ATKINSON, COMMON CARRIER BUREAU'S DEPUTY CHIEF, TO JOIN COLUMBIA INSTITUTE FOR TELE-INFORMATION

Washington, DC – Robert Atkinson, currently the Deputy Chief of the Federal Communications Commission's (FCC) Common Carrier Bureau, has been named Executive Director of the Columbia Institute for Tele-Information (CITI) at Columbia Business School in New York. At the FCC, Atkinson has been responsible for two of the Bureau's divisions, Policy & Program Planning and Industry Analysis.

Working with Professor Eli Noam, CITI's Director and founder, Atkinson will be responsible for expanding CITI into a multidisciplinary center, dedicated to research on the telecommunications and information industry. He will begin his CITI duties in mid-May.
