FACT SHEET SCHOOLS AND LIBRARIES PROGRAM

I. <u>Program Overview</u>

- The Schools and Libraries Program part of the Universal Service Fund was created in May 1997 when the Commission adopted the Universal Service Order, pursuant to the Telecommunications Act of 1996.
- The Schools and Libraries Program ensures that all eligible schools and libraries have affordable access to telecommunications services, Internet access and internal connections.
- The program is capped at \$2.25 billion annually to provide eligible schools and libraries with discounts ranging from 20% to 90% for authorized services.
- Eligible services range from basic local and long distance telephone services and Internet access services to the acquisition and installation of equipment for providing internal connections to telecommunications and information services.
- The Universal Service Administrative Company (USAC) administers all four universal service support mechanisms: 1) schools and libraries, 2) rural health care, 3) high cost, and 4) low income.
- Percentage of U.S. public schools that have received discounted services since the e-rate program began: 66%
- Percentage of U.S. classrooms connected to the Internet when the Telecommunications Act was passed: 14%
- Percentage of U.S. public school classrooms connected to the Internet 5 years after the Act passed (2001): 87%
