Brief Remarks of Commissioner Deborah Taylor Tate Summit on 911 Call Center Operations and Next Generation 911 Technologies

Good Morning! I am pleased to welcome all of you to this summit on 911 communications capabilities. I especially want to welcome the Russian delegation that has joined us today to learn about our 911 systems and public safety communications capabilities. Your presence illustrates how much we all share a common interest in keeping our citizens safe. As a former state regulator and now as an FCC Commissioner, I have always sought the knowledge of independent experts – you on the ground – for your honest assessment of our public policies. On matters related to

public safety and homeland security, nothing could be more important than straight talk, an honest assessment, and a commitment to get the policy right.
