Dear Chairman Genachowski:

As the Commission begins its 2010 quadrennial media ownership review, it should accelerate consideration of modifications to the newspaper/broadcast cross-ownership rule and revise the rule so that a proposed combination may be approved when the number of competing voices present in the community after the combination is sufficient to ensure the voicing of contrasting views on major issues.

We commend you and the Commission staff for holding workshops, beginning last year, on the FCC's media ownership rules. It is our understanding, however, that the Commission may formally commence its 2010 media ownership review with a Notice of Inquiry (NOI) rather than a Notice of Proposed Rulemaking (NPRM). Only after evaluating comments and reply comments on questions raised in the NOI would the FCC issue an NPRM regarding the rules themselves.

While we fully appreciate the desire to review all of the Commission's ownership rules together, a different approach for the newspaper/broadcast cross-ownership rule is warranted. It is no secret that newspapers and broadcast stations continue to struggle financially.

When the Commission considered the newspaper/broadcast cross-ownership rule during its 2002 media ownership review, it determined that this 1975 rule could no longer be justified, and it specifically found that the rule harms the production of local news content in markets of all sizes. However, the Commission's resulting 2003 repeal of the rule remains incomplete. Today, we are in essentially the same regulatory posture as 1975, except that today, both the Federal Communications Commission and the Federal Trade Commission have taken notice of the deteriorating state of our media and are considering what measures may be appropriate to save journalism. The volumes of data already elicited by the Commission make clear that the

newspaper/broadcast cross-ownership rule harms localism and hinders the crucial goal of maintaining an informed citizenry.

These considerations suggest that the Commission should separate its consideration of the newspaper/broadcast cross-ownership rule from the rest of the 2010 media ownership review and move directly to a NPRM on the newspaper/broadcast cross-ownership rule, so that evaluation of it can proceed as quickly as possible.

We suggest that the Commission release an NPRM that would permit newspaper/broadcast cross-ownership as long as the number of competing voices present in the community after approval of the combination is sufficient to ensure the voicing of contrasting views on major issues. The Commission should also preserve all existing waivers and grandfathers of the newspaper/broadcast cross-ownership rule.

Proceeding directly to an NPRM on this rule is not an action that will deny interested parties a chance to thoroughly vet the rule. An NPRM regarding the newspaper/broadcast cross-ownership rule would be subject to standard Commission procedures, including the usual cycle of comments and reply comments and *ex parte* meetings and submissions.

It is time for the Commission, under your leadership, to move forward on this matter and to do so without the delay that would be occasioned by an NOI. We look forward to receiving your response by April 1, 2010, and to working with you and your colleagues to advance our shared goals of preserving journalism and localism.
