Dear Senator Moran:

Thank you for your letter stressing the importance of accurately measuring mobile broadband coverage across the country.

As you note, universal service has been foundational to federal communications policy. As more and more households rely on mobile devices, the FCC must have reliable data on mobile broadband coverage. Let me assure you that the Commission is currently working to improve how we measure mobile coverage.

In the past, we have confronted several challenges in our attempts to measure coverage in a way that matches up with the public's real-world experiences. The biggest of these challenges involved the process of data collection. For the past several years, the Commission relied on data that came from states via the National Telecommunications Information Agency – data that was used in the National Broadband Map – and third party commercial vendors. For a variety of reasons, the data collected by the states and third party commercial vendors did not always accurately reflect the real world experiences of your constituents.

Recognizing the need to improve our mobile coverage data, the Commission adopted an order in 2013 that required mobile wireless data collection from one of the most reliable sources available — the mobile wireless carriers themselves. As a result the Commission is now collecting coverage data directly from wireless carriers through the Commission's Form 477. Each carrier that submits data must certify to its accuracy. We expect the data wireless carriers provide through these submissions will be more accurate than our previous data because it comes directly from the entity that is deploying the wireless facilities. We are in the relatively early stages of collecting this new coverage data from wireless carriers through the revised FCC Form 477, and Commission staff are currently analyzing these filings.

It is my hope that these efforts will improve the Commission's ability to accurately measure mobile broadband coverage throughout the country. Thank you for the opportunity to address this important issue. I share your goal of providing access to essential communications for all Americans, and we are committed to policies that achieve the goal of universal service.
