

Communications Status Report for Areas Impacted by Hurricane Fiona September 26, 2022

The following is a report on the status of communications services in geographic areas impacted by Hurricane Fiona as of September 26, 2022, at 12:00 p.m. EDT.¹ This report incorporates network outage data submitted by communications providers to the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) Disaster Information Reporting System (DIRS). Note that the operational status of communications services during an event may evolve rapidly, and this report represents a snapshot in time.

The FCC deactivated DIRS for Hurricane Fiona in the U.S. Virgin Islands at 5:00 p.m. EDT on September 19, 2022.

The following counties/municipalities in Puerto Rico are in the current geographic area that is part of DIRS (the “disaster area”) for today’s report.

The Public Safety and Homeland Security Bureau (PSHSB) learns the status of each Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP) through the filings of 911 Service Providers in DIRS, reporting to the FCC’s Public Safety Support Center, coordination with state 911 Administrators, and, if necessary, direct contact with individual PSAPs.

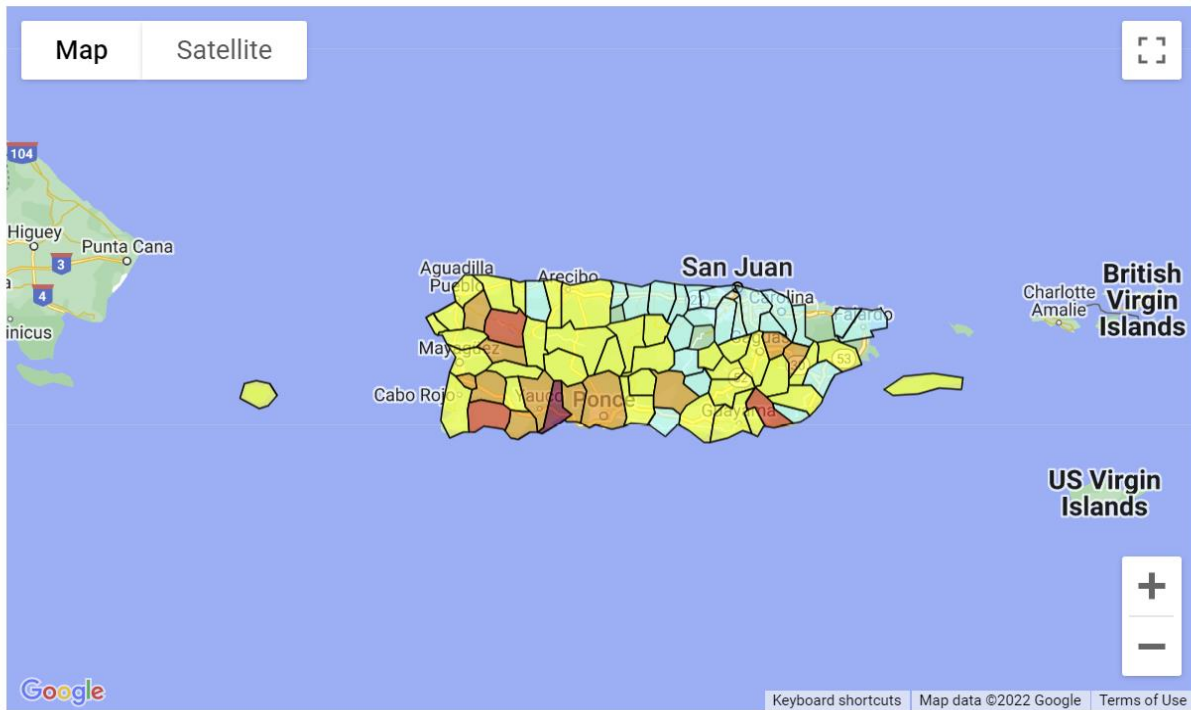
Puerto Rico: No PSAPs are reported as being affected.

The number of cell site outages in a specific area does not necessarily correspond to the availability of wireless service to consumers in that area. See Improving the Resiliency of Mobile Wireless Communications Networks, Order, 31 FCC Rcd 13745, para. 10 (2016) (recognizing the difficulties in accurately depicting the ongoing status of a wireless provider’s service during emergencies). Wireless networks are often designed with numerous, overlapping cell sites that provide maximum capacity and continuity of service even when an individual site is inoperable. In addition, wireless providers frequently use temporary facilities, such as cells-on-wheels (also known as COWs), increase power at operational sites, initiate roaming agreements, or take other actions to maintain service to affected consumers during emergencies or other events that result in cell site outages.

Cable Systems and Wireline (Combined)

Cable and wireline companies reported 503,664 subscribers out of service in the disaster area for Hurricane Fiona; this includes the loss of telephone, television, and/or Internet services. This is down from 504,730 subscribers as of yesterday.

Broadcast:

Television stations status:

- No TV stations are reported as being out of service.

FM Radio stations status:

- 5 FM stations are reported as being out of service.

AM Radio stations status:

- 2 AM stations are reported as being out of service.



Special Temporary Authority (STA)/Waivers/Extensions

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) may grant Special Temporary Authority (STA) to permit immediate or temporary operation of certain radio facilities during emergencies or other urgent conditions, as well as waivers to support emergency communications and service restoration.

- Extension of the Fiscal Year 2022 regulatory fee deadline date for regulatory fee payors in the affected areas of Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands from 11:59 PM, Eastern Daylight Time, on September 28, 2022, to 11:59 PM, Eastern Daylight Time, on September 30, 2022.
- Extension of filing and regulatory deadlines in areas affected by Hurricane Fiona
- Waiver of number aging rule for providers affected by Hurricane Fiona
- Waiver offering relief for USF/Appropriated Programs participants in Puerto Rico that are affected by Hurricane Fiona
- Wireless Telecommunications Bureau conditionally grants Federated Wireless's request for an emergency waiver of sections 96.67(c)(2) and (3) of the Commission's rules
