Dear Madame Chair:

I am writing to keep you updated regarding the status of the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP). I last wrote you on January 8, 2024 to explain that the remaining funding we have for the ACP—the largest and most successful broadband affordability program in our Nation’s history—is insufficient to support consumers who count on this program beyond April 2024.

There is broad-based support for additional funding for the ACP.<sup>1</sup> Since I last wrote, on January 10, 2024, the bipartisan Affordable Connectivity Program Extension Act was introduced in the House and Senate and would provide \$7 billion in additional funding for the ACP.<sup>2</sup> More than 400 entities, including state, local and Tribal governments, non-profit organizations, and service providers have expressed support for the Affordable Connectivity Program Extension Act.<sup>3</sup>

My January 8, 2024 letter stressed that more funding is needed to keep the ACP in place, and that absent additional funding, the Commission would need to take steps to start orderly wind-down procedures for the ACP. Accordingly, on January 11, 2024, the Commission issued guidance to ACP providers and other stakeholders to start the orderly procedures to wind-down the ACP.<sup>4</sup> This guidance requires providers to send multiple written notices to ACP subscribers regarding the end of the program. To this end, by January 25, 2024, providers were required to send their ACP subscribers the first notice about the end of the program and the potential impact

on their bills. As the wind down proceeds, households enrolled in the ACP will receive additional written notices from providers, as well as the Universal Service Administrative Company, with more detail about the end of the ACP and impact on their bill when the program ceases.

The Commission's January 11, 2024 guidance also announced that the ACP would stop accepting new enrollments on February 8, 2024. As my earlier letter explained, the enrollment freeze is necessary to slow the depletion of the remaining funding and reduce volatility in the program. This step will also stabilize the number of households affected by the end of the ACP and reduce consumer confusion. Following the enrollment freeze, the Commission will finalize its projection of the end date of the ACP.

It bears repeating that today nearly 23 million households nationwide are enrolled in and benefitting from the ACP. In order to provide you with more detail about the distribution of this program and the many households that count on it to get online and stay online, attached is public information regarding ACP enrollments, with data for each state, territory, and congressional district.

Without additional funding for the ACP, these households will lose an important benefit and are at risk of losing the internet service they rely on for work, school, health care and more. In fact, based on the results from a recent Commission survey of ACP subscribers, nearly three-quarters of households use their ACP-funded internet for health care, approximately half use it for employment, and approximately three-quarters of ACP subscribers between 18 and 24 years of age use it for school. The survey results further indicate that if the ACP ends, more than three-quarters of the households that count on this program would experience service disruption or would have to change their existing plan or stop service altogether. These survey results are consistent with other survey data showing that many ACP households will struggle to afford internet if they no longer receive the ACP benefit.<sup>5</sup>

I hope you find this information helpful. The Commission stands ready to assist Congress with any efforts to fully fund the ACP into the future.

Dear Madam Chair:

I am writing to keep you updated regarding the status of the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP). I last wrote you on January 8, 2024 to explain that the remaining funding we have for the ACP—the largest and most successful broadband affordability program in our Nation’s history—is insufficient to support consumers who count on this program beyond April 2024.

There is broad-based support for additional funding for the ACP.<sup>11</sup> Since I last wrote, on January 10, 2024, the bipartisan Affordable Connectivity Program Extension Act was introduced in the House and Senate and would provide \$7 billion in additional funding for the ACP.<sup>12</sup> More than 400 entities, including state, local and Tribal governments, non-profit organizations, and service providers have expressed support for the Affordable Connectivity Program Extension Act.<sup>13</sup>

My January 8, 2024 letter stressed that more funding is needed to keep the ACP in place, and that absent additional funding, the Commission would need to take steps to start orderly wind-down procedures for the ACP. Accordingly, on January 11, 2024, the Commission issued guidance to ACP providers and other stakeholders to start the orderly procedures to wind-down the ACP.<sup>14</sup> This guidance requires providers to send multiple written notices to ACP subscribers regarding the end of the program. To this end, by January 25, 2024, providers were required to send their ACP subscribers the first notice about the end of the program and the potential impact

on their bills. As the wind down proceeds, households enrolled in the ACP will receive additional written notices from providers, as well as the Universal Service Administrative Company, with more detail about the end of the ACP and impact on their bill when the program ceases.

The Commission's January 11, 2024 guidance also announced that the ACP would stop accepting new enrollments on February 8, 2024. As my earlier letter explained, the enrollment freeze is necessary to slow the depletion of the remaining funding and reduce volatility in the program. This step will also stabilize the number of households affected by the end of the ACP and reduce consumer confusion. Following the enrollment freeze, the Commission will finalize its projection of the end date of the ACP.

It bears repeating that today nearly 23 million households nationwide are enrolled in and benefitting from the ACP. In order to provide you with more detail about the distribution of this program and the many households that count on it to get online and stay online, attached is public information regarding ACP enrollments, with data for each state, territory, and congressional district.

Without additional funding for the ACP, these households will lose an important benefit and are at risk of losing the internet service they rely on for work, school, health care and more. In fact, based on the results from a recent Commission survey of ACP subscribers, nearly three-quarters of households use their ACP-funded internet for health care, approximately half use it for employment, and approximately three-quarters of ACP subscribers between 18 and 24 years of age use it for school. The survey results further indicate that if the ACP ends, more than three-quarters of the households that count on this program would experience service disruption or would have to change their existing plan or stop service altogether. These survey results are consistent with other survey data showing that many ACP households will struggle to afford internet if they no longer receive the ACP benefit.<sup>15</sup>

I hope you find this information helpful. The Commission stands ready to assist Congress with any efforts to fully fund the ACP into the future.

Dear Ranking Member Pallone:

I am writing to keep you updated regarding the status of the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP). I last wrote you on January 8, 2024 to explain that the remaining funding we have for the ACP—the largest and most successful broadband affordability program in our Nation’s history—is insufficient to support consumers who count on this program beyond April 2024.

There is broad-based support for additional funding for the ACP.<sup>16</sup> Since I last wrote, on January 10, 2024, the bipartisan Affordable Connectivity Program Extension Act was introduced in the House and Senate and would provide \$7 billion in additional funding for the ACP.<sup>17</sup> More than 400 entities, including state, local and Tribal governments, non-profit organizations, and service providers have expressed support for the Affordable Connectivity Program Extension Act.<sup>18</sup>

My January 8, 2024 letter stressed that more funding is needed to keep the ACP in place, and that absent additional funding, the Commission would need to take steps to start orderly wind-down procedures for the ACP. Accordingly, on January 11, 2024, the Commission issued guidance to ACP providers and other stakeholders to start the orderly procedures to wind-down the ACP.<sup>19</sup> This guidance requires providers to send multiple written notices to ACP subscribers regarding the end of the program. To this end, by January 25, 2024, providers were required to send their ACP subscribers the first notice about the end of the program and the potential impact

on their bills. As the wind down proceeds, households enrolled in the ACP will receive additional written notices from providers, as well as the Universal Service Administrative Company, with more detail about the end of the ACP and impact on their bill when the program ceases.

The Commission's January 11, 2024 guidance also announced that the ACP would stop accepting new enrollments on February 8, 2024. As my earlier letter explained, the enrollment freeze is necessary to slow the depletion of the remaining funding and reduce volatility in the program. This step will also stabilize the number of households affected by the end of the ACP and reduce consumer confusion. Following the enrollment freeze, the Commission will finalize its projection of the end date of the ACP.

It bears repeating that today nearly 23 million households nationwide are enrolled in and benefitting from the ACP. In order to provide you with more detail about the distribution of this program and the many households that count on it to get online and stay online, attached is public information regarding ACP enrollments, with data for each state, territory, and congressional district.

Without additional funding for the ACP, these households will lose an important benefit and are at risk of losing the internet service they rely on for work, school, health care and more. In fact, based on the results from a recent Commission survey of ACP subscribers, nearly three-quarters of households use their ACP-funded internet for health care, approximately half use it for employment, and approximately three-quarters of ACP subscribers between 18 and 24 years of age use it for school. The survey results further indicate that if the ACP ends, more than three-quarters of the households that count on this program would experience service disruption or would have to change their existing plan or stop service altogether. These survey results are consistent with other survey data showing that many ACP households will struggle to afford internet if they no longer receive the ACP benefit.<sup>20</sup>

I hope you find this information helpful. The Commission stands ready to assist Congress with any efforts to fully fund the ACP into the future.

Dear Chairman Van Hollen:

I am writing to keep you updated regarding the status of the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP). I last wrote you on January 8, 2024 to explain that the remaining funding we have for the ACP—the largest and most successful broadband affordability program in our Nation’s history—is insufficient to support consumers who count on this program beyond April 2024.

There is broad-based support for additional funding for the ACP.<sup>31</sup> Since I last wrote, on January 10, 2024, the bipartisan Affordable Connectivity Program Extension Act was introduced in the House and Senate and would provide \$7 billion in additional funding for the ACP.<sup>32</sup> More than 400 entities, including state, local and Tribal governments, non-profit organizations, and service providers have expressed support for the Affordable Connectivity Program Extension Act.<sup>33</sup>

My January 8, 2024 letter stressed that more funding is needed to keep the ACP in place, and that absent additional funding, the Commission would need to take steps to start orderly wind-down procedures for the ACP. Accordingly, on January 11, 2024, the Commission issued guidance to ACP providers and other stakeholders to start the orderly procedures to wind-down the ACP.<sup>34</sup> This guidance requires providers to send multiple written notices to ACP subscribers regarding the end of the program. To this end, by January 25, 2024, providers were required to

send their ACP subscribers the first notice about the end of the program and the potential impact on their bills. As the wind down proceeds, households enrolled in the ACP will receive additional written notices from providers, as well as the Universal Service Administrative Company, with more detail about the end of the ACP and impact on their bill when the program ceases.

The Commission's January 11, 2024 guidance also announced that the ACP would stop accepting new enrollments on February 8, 2024. As my earlier letter explained, the enrollment freeze is necessary to slow the depletion of the remaining funding and reduce volatility in the program. This step will also stabilize the number of households affected by the end of the ACP and reduce consumer confusion. Following the enrollment freeze, the Commission will finalize its projection of the end date of the ACP.

It bears repeating that today nearly 23 million households nationwide are enrolled in and benefitting from the ACP. In order to provide you with more detail about the distribution of this program and the many households that count on it to get online and stay online, attached is public information regarding ACP enrollments, with data for each state, territory, and congressional district.

Without additional funding for the ACP, these households will lose an important benefit and are at risk of losing the internet service they rely on for work, school, health care and more. In fact, based on the results from a recent Commission survey of ACP subscribers, nearly three-quarters of households use their ACP-funded internet for health care, approximately half use it for employment, and approximately three-quarters of ACP subscribers between 18 and 24 years of age use it for school. The survey results further indicate that if the ACP ends, more than three-quarters of the households that count on this program would experience service disruption or would have to change their existing plan or stop service altogether. These survey results are consistent with other survey data showing that many ACP households will struggle to afford internet if they no longer receive the ACP benefit.<sup>35</sup>

I hope you find this information helpful. The Commission stands ready to assist Congress with any efforts to fully fund the ACP into the future.

send their ACP subscribers the first notice about the end of the program and the potential impact on their bills. As the wind down proceeds, households enrolled in the ACP will receive additional written notices from providers, as well as the Universal Service Administrative Company, with more detail about the end of the ACP and impact on their bill when the program ceases.

The Commission's January 11, 2024 guidance also announced that the ACP would stop accepting new enrollments on February 8, 2024. As my earlier letter explained, the enrollment freeze is necessary to slow the depletion of the remaining funding and reduce volatility in the program. This step will also stabilize the number of households affected by the end of the ACP and reduce consumer confusion. Following the enrollment freeze, the Commission will finalize its projection of the end date of the ACP.

It bears repeating that today nearly 23 million households nationwide are enrolled in and benefitting from the ACP. In order to provide you with more detail about the distribution of this program and the many households that count on it to get online and stay online, attached is public information regarding ACP enrollments, with data for each state, territory, and congressional district.

Without additional funding for the ACP, these households will lose an important benefit and are at risk of losing the internet service they rely on for work, school, health care and more. In fact, based on the results from a recent Commission survey of ACP subscribers, nearly three-quarters of households use their ACP-funded internet for health care, approximately half use it for employment, and approximately three-quarters of ACP subscribers between 18 and 24 years of age use it for school. The survey results further indicate that if the ACP ends, more than three-quarters of the households that count on this program would experience service disruption or would have to change their existing plan or stop service altogether. These survey results are consistent with other survey data showing that many ACP households will struggle to afford internet if they no longer receive the ACP benefit.<sup>40</sup>

I hope you find this information helpful. The Commission stands ready to assist Congress with any efforts to fully fund the ACP into the future.

I am writing to keep you updated regarding the status of the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP). I last wrote you on January 8, 2024 to explain that the remaining funding we have for the ACP—the largest and most successful broadband affordability program in our Nation’s history—is insufficient to support consumers who count on this program beyond April 2024.

There is broad-based support for additional funding for the ACP.<sup>21</sup> Since I last wrote, on January 10, 2024, the bipartisan Affordable Connectivity Program Extension Act was introduced in the House and Senate and would provide \$7 billion in additional funding for the ACP.<sup>22</sup> More than 400 entities, including state, local and Tribal governments, non-profit organizations, and service providers have expressed support for the Affordable Connectivity Program Extension Act.<sup>23</sup>

My January 8, 2024 letter stressed that more funding is needed to keep the ACP in place, and that absent additional funding, the Commission would need to take steps to start orderly wind-down procedures for the ACP. Accordingly, on January 11, 2024, the Commission issued guidance to ACP providers and other stakeholders to start the orderly procedures to wind-down the ACP.<sup>24</sup> This guidance requires providers to send multiple written notices to ACP subscribers regarding the end of the program. To this end, by January 25, 2024, providers were required to

Dear Ranking Member Hoyer:

I am writing to keep you updated regarding the status of the Affordable Connectivity Program (ACP). I last wrote you on January 8, 2024 to explain that the remaining funding we have for the ACP—the largest and most successful broadband affordability program in our Nation’s history—is insufficient to support consumers who count on this program beyond April 2024.

There is broad-based support for additional funding for the ACP.<sup>26</sup> Since I last wrote, on January 10, 2024, the bipartisan Affordable Connectivity Program Extension Act was introduced in the House and Senate and would provide \$7 billion in additional funding for the ACP.<sup>27</sup> More than 400 entities, including state, local and Tribal governments, non-profit organizations, and service providers have expressed support for the Affordable Connectivity Program Extension Act.<sup>28</sup>

My January 8, 2024 letter stressed that more funding is needed to keep the ACP in place, and that absent additional funding, the Commission would need to take steps to start orderly wind-down procedures for the ACP. Accordingly, on January 11, 2024, the Commission issued guidance to ACP providers and other stakeholders to start the orderly procedures to wind-down the ACP.<sup>29</sup> This guidance requires providers to send multiple written notices to ACP subscribers regarding the end of the program. To this end, by January 25, 2024, providers were required to

send their ACP subscribers the first notice about the end of the program and the potential impact on their bills. As the wind down proceeds, households enrolled in the ACP will receive additional written notices from providers, as well as the Universal Service Administrative Company, with more detail about the end of the ACP and impact on their bill when the program ceases.

The Commission's January 11, 2024 guidance also announced that the ACP would stop accepting new enrollments on February 8, 2024. As my earlier letter explained, the enrollment freeze is necessary to slow the depletion of the remaining funding and reduce volatility in the program. This step will also stabilize the number of households affected by the end of the ACP and reduce consumer confusion. Following the enrollment freeze, the Commission will finalize its projection of the end date of the ACP.

It bears repeating that today nearly 23 million households nationwide are enrolled in and benefitting from the ACP. In order to provide you with more detail about the distribution of this program and the many households that count on it to get online and stay online, attached is public information regarding ACP enrollments, with data for each state, territory, and congressional district.

Without additional funding for the ACP, these households will lose an important benefit and are at risk of losing the internet service they rely on for work, school, health care and more. In fact, based on the results from a recent Commission survey of ACP subscribers, nearly three-quarters of households use their ACP-funded internet for health care, approximately half use it for employment, and approximately three-quarters of ACP subscribers between 18 and 24 years of age use it for school. The survey results further indicate that if the ACP ends, more than three-quarters of the households that count on this program would experience service disruption or would have to change their existing plan or stop service altogether. These survey results are consistent with other survey data showing that many ACP households will struggle to afford internet if they no longer receive the ACP benefit.<sup>30</sup>

I hope you find this information helpful. The Commission stands ready to assist Congress with any efforts to fully fund the ACP into the future.
