I agree with you that broadcasters fulfill an important public interest goal when they deliver live and local news, information, and other programming, including educational content and emergency alerts. I want to encourage and empower broadcasters to fulfill their localism and public interest obligations.

Your letter also asks about the FCC's ongoing investigation into NPR, PBS, and their member stations. With respect to noncommercial educational broadcast stations (or NCEs) like the relevant NPR and PBS member stations, Congress provided in the Communications Act that those stations may not air commercials or other promotional announcements on behalf of forprofit entities. For-profit entities that contribute funds to NCE stations may receive on-air acknowledgements, but the FCC has long held that those underwriting announcements are for identification purposes only.

The FCC's investigation is examining whether NPR and PBS member stations are broadcasting underwriting announcements that cross the line into prohibited commercial advertisements. After all, as the Chairman of the FCC, I have an obligation to ensure that broadcasters comply with the terms of their federal licenses. That investigation remains ongoing and no final decisions have been made at this time.
